

Students are asked to wear St.Angela T-shirts and will be receiving a poppy or poppy sticker and also take part in Remembrance day activities.


St. Angela families are welcome to donate online to the National Poppy

DIGITAL FOOTPRINT

Through out the year, themes will be highlighted monthly to support your child's journey as a digital citizenship. Join them as a partner in their education navigating the digital world!





What is a Digital Footprint?

For children in grades 4-6, a digital footprint is the collection of traces they leave behind as they interact with the internet. By this age, kids may begin using search engines, educational platforms, social apps, and possibly messaging tools, which means their online actions—such as posting, searching, or commenting—become part of their digital record. This footprint can be both active (content they post, comment on, or share) and passive (data collected about them, like search history or location tracking). Understanding their digital footprint helps children become aware of their online presence and begin forming responsible digital habits.

Digital Footprint Tips for Parents

Encourage Responsible Sharing: Talk with your child about how their online posts, comments, and shares create a lasting digital footprint. Encourage them to share only what they're comfortable with others seeing long-term, and to ask themselves if it's kind, safe, and respectful before posting.

Explain Active and Passive Footprints: Help children understand that even actions like "liking" a post or visiting a website contribute to their digital footprint. Discuss the difference between what they choose to share (active) and what's automatically tracked (passive), like their location on certain apps.

Reinforce the Importance of Privacy: Discuss why it's essential to keep personal information private, even if they feel "safe" online. Explain that details like full name, address, phone number, or school should never be shared online without permission, even in seemingly private messages or profiles.

Model Positive Digital Behavior: Show them examples of positive online interactions, like supportive comments or sharing educational content. Demonstrating thoughtful online choices helps reinforce that they can create a positive digital footprint.

Help Them Understand Online Permanence: Explain that once something is shared online, it can be difficult or impossible to erase, even if they delete it. Encourage them to think carefully before posting anything that might affect their online reputation or image.

Encourage Open Communication: Make sure your child knows they can come to you if they see or experience anything online that makes them uncomfortable. Building this trust helps them navigate digital spaces with more confidence and responsibility.
