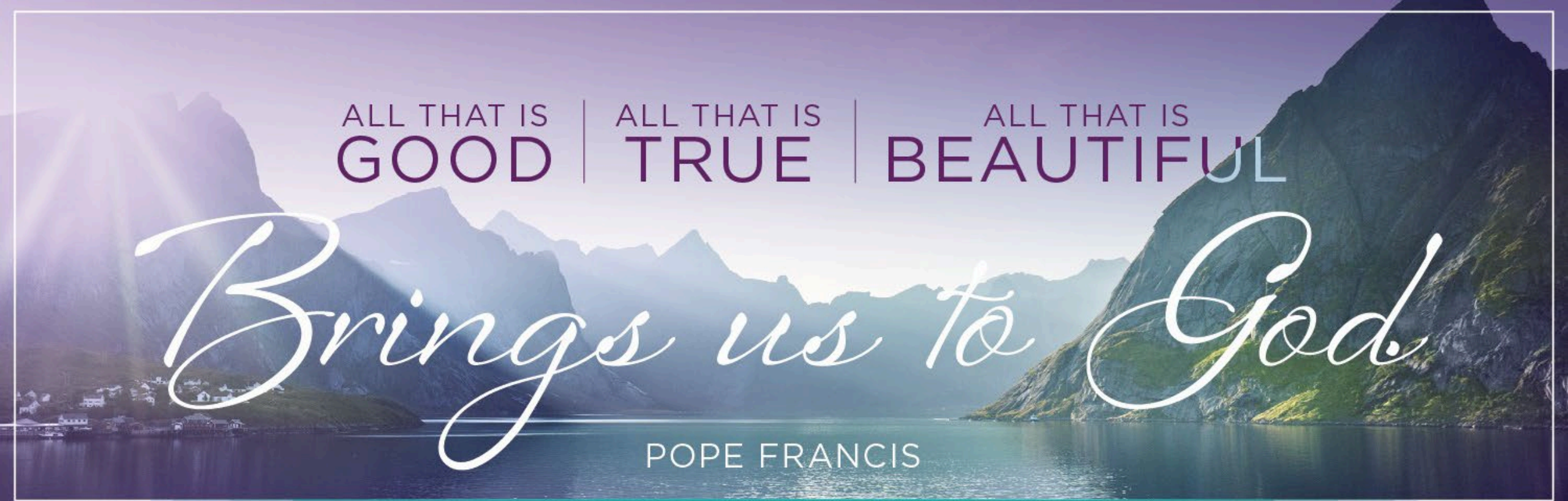

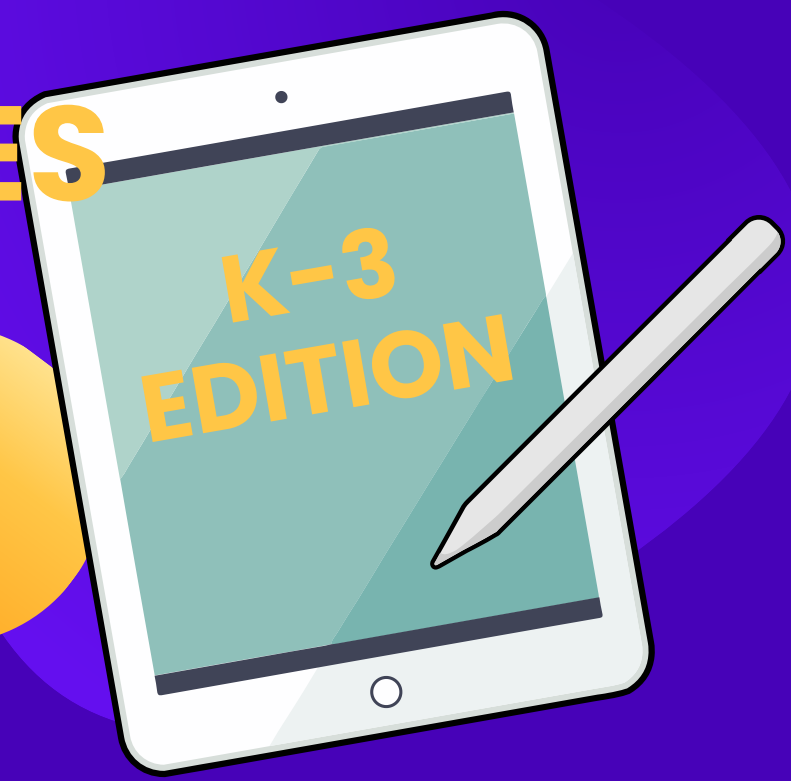

WHAT PARENTS NEED TO KNOW ABOUT DIGITAL RIGHTS & RESPONSIBILITIES

What is Important About Digital Rights & Responsibilities?

Children are using technology at an early age to learn, play, and connect with others, making it important to teach them about digital rights and responsibilities. These include understanding their right to feel safe and respected online, and their responsibility to be kind, take care of devices, and ask for help when unsure. Even small actions online matter. Young children learn best through simple rules, clear routines, and the guidance of trusted adults, helping them build healthy and safe digital habits from the start.

Digital Rights & Responsibility Tips for Parents



Talk about kindness online, just like in person.

“What are kind words you can say when you’re playing a game or sending a message?”

Explain that rules exist online just like at school.

“There are helpers who make sure the internet is a safe place. We need to follow the rules when we use apps or websites.”

Use real-life examples.

Point out pop-ups or permission screens and say, “This is when we ask a grown-up for help.”

Practice privacy.

Teach your child not to share personal details like their full name, school, or birthday online.

Create a simple family tech promise.

Together, come up with 3 rules for safe, respectful, and fun tech use at home.

What is Important About Digital Rights & Responsibilities?



As children in grades 4 to 6 begin using technology more independently for learning, socializing, and creating, it's important they understand their digital rights and responsibilities. They have the right to privacy, safety, and respectful communication, and they are responsible for what they post, share, and say online. At this age, students start to grasp how their digital actions leave a footprint and carry real-world consequences. It's also a key time to build critical thinking around user agreements, data sharing, and how they engage with others in digital spaces.

Rules

Digital Rights & Responsibility Tips for Parents



Ask open-ended questions.

“What kinds of things do you think people should and shouldn't share online?”

“What would you do if someone posted something unkind?”

Talk about digital footprints.

“Everything you post or say online is like a footprint — where do you want your path to lead?”

Review privacy settings and user agreements together.

Look at a website or app and ask, “What information are they asking for? Why do you think they want it?”

Encourage digital empathy.

Discuss how others might feel reading a message or being left out of a group chat or game.

Create a family tech code of conduct.

Work together to set shared rules about time limits, respectful behavior, and what to do when something feels uncomfortable online.
